21 Smith Tower

An example of neoclassical architecture. Its outer skin is granite on the first and second floors, and terracotta on the rest. Designed by Edwin H. and T. Walker Gaggin and built in 1914. The tallest building on the West Coast of America when it was built, Smith Tower is one big monument of white, ornamented terra-cotta wrapped around steel. The quality of the material was so good, it didn't get its first detergent wash until 1976.



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
